## SMARTPHONE APP FOR PRICING SILAGE

Greg Blonde and his UW-Extension colleague from St. Croix County, Ryan Sterry, teamed up this summer to develop a new, free Android app that can quickly estimate the value of standing corn silage. The app includes active links to help users find current corn and hay market prices and then enter their own yield estimates and harvest costs. The app also calculates the difference in value of nutrients removed from the soil when harvested as whole plant silage versus corn for grain to more accurately reflect standing value per acre. The app is free and available for Android smart phones and tablets (or search for "Corn Silage Pricing" on the Google Play Store).

# SUMMARY OF LAND SALES DATA FOR 2015

Recently released land sales data for 2015 shows the average price for land continuing in farming in Waupaca County was just under **\$3,500/acre** last year with a range of \$1,800 to \$4,900 for bare farmland without buildings or improvements (no sales were reported for land diverted to non-farm use). These numbers are based on eight "arm-length transactions" covering almost 600 acres. *It's important to note, these "arms-length transactions" do not include sales between family members and also exclude distressed financial sales involving foreclosure or bankruptcy.* The following tables show a 5-year price trend for both farm and forest land in Waupaca County. Immediately following the cow classes on Saturday, Junior Fair dairy judging wraps up with showmanship...Seniors (grades 11-13), followed by Intermediate (grades 9-10), Junior (grades 6-8), and finally Beginner (grades 3-5).

# **Corn Silage Moisture Testing** Starting Wed. Sept 7

Corn that tasseled by mid July will likely be ready to harvest as corn silage by early September. Harvesting quality silage at the proper time is one way dairy farmers can strengthen their bottom line. Silage chopped too wet reduces yield, lowers dry matter intake by the cows as well. But harvesting too dry may also reduce yield and lower protein, vitamins and fiber digestibility.

Whole plant moisture analysis is the best way to maximize corn silage yield and quality. As a result, whole plant moisture testing will be available every Wednesday during September from 10 AM - 2 PM in Clintonville and Weyauwega. Farmers and/or consultants are encouraged to bring 3-4 whole corn plants cut at normal silage height on the following days/locations for free moisture analysis:

## Market Update & Outlook

Dairy margins continued to strengthen in July, with milk price rising and feed costs declining. Milk prices were supported by the latest USDA report, which raised forecasts for milk and dairy product prices due to slower growth in the U.S. dairy herd; however, moderating feed costs are expected to lead to growth in the dairy herd next year. Meanwhile, above normal temperature is predicted to continue into August and Sept across the Plains and Midwest regions, which may compromise cow comfort and lead to lower milk production.

As expected, USDA also raised their forecast for corn ending stocks following a June 30 acreage report that revealed higher planted area. While new-crop corn ending stocks were revised up from June, increased demand offset some of the higher production forecast. USDA projected Brazil's corn crop down 7.5 million tons from their previous estimate, which will translate to higher U.S. corn exports in both the old-crop and newcrop marketing years. Strong demand for soybeans led to similar projections, with higher exports and crush absorbing some of the impact from increased
