# **Call to Order and Welcome Guests**

# **Approval of Minutes**

There were no minutes from January as the meeting was cancelled due to weather. The December minutes were brief due to the Christmas party and were included in the January newsletter distributed previously.

## **Audit Committee Report**

Sally summarized the January 3, 2018, audit committee's report (Tom S/Terry K) and handed out a hard copy to the membership present. She stated the record keeping was in good order. The auditing committee advised that a voucher form should accompany all future checks.

# Treasurer's Report and Review, Discussion & Potential Approval of Budget for 2018

Bridget gave the treasurer's report. Sue and Bridget summarized the 2018 budget and explained all changes. The membership voted to accept the budget and all were in favor.

#### **Committee Reports:**

Extension educators and volunteers have a long history of supporting garden-based education programs and projects for individuals and communities. However, traditional program design and evaluation may not always deliver and capture the full extent of outcomes for the participant. Or, educators and volunteers are asked to deliver a program to a population in which they have no prior experience. The incorporation of principles and practices of horticultural therapy as well as thoughtful program design can improve the experience of participants in our garden-based education programs, better communicate the full extent of impacts, and give confidence to educators and volunteers to expand program access to new non-traditional audiences.

Therapeutic horticulture is the process by which individuals may develop well-being using plants and horticulture. It is not only an emerging profession, it is a time-proven

practice. The therapeutic benefits of peaceful garden environments have been understood since ancient times. It is recognized as a practical and viable treatment with wide-ranging benefits for people in therapeutic, vocational and wellness programs, which include Veterans, hospital and correctional inmates, Alzheimer patients and individuals with disabilities.
