Be Alert:

The invasive lily leaf beetle has been identified in Shawano County. Waupaca Co. might be the next to detect the LLB insect something for Master Gardeners to have on their radar!

I recently received some images showing the larvae of the invasive lily leaf beetle causing significant damage to lilies in a residential yard; based on the report, an adult beetle had been spotted earlier in the spring as well. The report was from far western Shawano County (near Wittenberg), about 30 miles east of Wausau.

The lily leaf beetle first popped up in Wisconsin in 2014 (Marathon county) and has since been found in neighboring Lincoln, Wood, and Portage counties; it is originally from Europe but has been in North America since the 1940's. Shawano is the 5th Wisconsin county with a confirmed detection. This pest causes significant damage to true lilies (it doesn't like daylilies) and a few other plants. The Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection developed a bulletin a few years ago: http://labs.russell.wisc.edu/insectid/files/201 4/03/Lily-Leaf-Beetle-Pest-Alert.pdf. The bulletin discusses the biology and management of this pest.

Monarch Joint Venture

I am the regional monitoring coordinator for the <u>Monarch Joint Venture</u>, a partnership to conserve monarchs and their habitat. I'm reaching out to Master Gardener programs with an interesting project linking plants and monarchs.

MJV is helping roll out the <u>Integrated</u> <u>Monarch Monitoring Program</u> (IMMP), which is a national initiative to

monitor both monarchs *and* their habitat across the breeding range. The IMMP was developed by a collaboration of federal, NGO, and academic staff, and will:

 \cdot Acquire and share information about how habitat conservation actions affect monarchs and their habitat

• Provide geographically and ecologically representative information to update population and habitat models

 \cdot Track long-term changes in the distribution and abundance of monarchs and their habitats

We are holding a workshop in New London at the Mosquito Hill Nature Center July 21-22 to train conservation staff and citizen scientists in this program. We would like to share the opportunity with Master Gardeners.

Monitoring consists of four optional activities. Master gardeners have a unique ability to greatly contribute to this effort by identifying nectar resources on survey sites.

At the workshop, you will learn about monarch biology; monarch and milkweed identification; how to survey for nectar resources, milkweed, monarch eggs, larvae and adults; and how to raise monarchs. You can then conduct any of these activities on your monitoring site.

Registration is open for a workshop in New London (July 21-22). \$50 registration covers meals both days and your very own monitoring kit. Space is limited to 30 participants. <u>Click here</u> for details and to register.
