WCMGV Meeting Minutes

Thursday March 12, 2020: Submitted by Ila Sanders (THANK YOU!)

President Debbie Krogwold called the March meeting together at 6:30 p.m. We welcomed one guest. The December 12 meeting minutes were approved with a motion by Sally M-H, seconded by Pat R. Pat informed us of the State Conference to be held Sept.11-12. A motion to approve a \$50.00 donation from the WCMGV was made by Joan S., seconded by Doug P. Pat awarded certificates detailing hours of service to several members. Year notations for name tags were also distributed.

The treasurer's report was given by Rebecca W-S. The budget for 2020 was presented, along with a comparison of the 2019 budget. Pat R. moved that a \$500.00 amount be added to the 2020 budget for this year's student scholarship, seconded by Jane W.

Ila Sanders addressed the current scholarship deadline, encouraging members to help promote the due date of March 30, 2020. (Note: at this writing, the deadline may need to be updated due to school closings.)

Debbie K. and Virginia M. reported on the completion of the audit for 2019.

Pat R. indicated that the By Laws and Standard Operating Procedures may be affected by the changes on the state level.

Sally M-H reported on the membership committee. We currently have 29 members. Sally will follow up with membership scholarship awards to the new members.

Carrie E. and Patty T-V will chair the Program/Publicity/Promotion committee for 2020. Various ideas were offered for upcoming meetings.

Debbie K. reported on the Plant Sale Committee: publicity, labels, etc. are being addressed. The educational display will cover the topic of jumping worms. More details will follow. Sally M-H, as chairperson of the Garden Walk Committee, reported that 6 gardens in the Waupaca/Fremont area will be showcased. It was decided that plants would again be sold at the Red Mill and St. Mary Magdalene's Church, two of this years' gardens. Upcoming meetings are April 22, May 20 and June 10 for the respective groups involved.

An update on the Waupaca Children's Garden was given by Doug P. An impressive mission statement was read, and upcoming dates were detailed. Doug has worked with the Park and Rec Department, promoting the project through their spring booklet. Plans are to begin meeting on May 16.

Rebecca W-S reported that the New London Children's Garden will hold its monthly meetings on Thursdays at Pfeifer Park with a maximum of 16 students participating.

Invitations from both the Waupaca Library and Turner's Farm Market (to provide educational presentations before the Spring Plant Sale related to gardening) were discussed. The consensus of the group was to not become involved at this time due to the busy schedule with the Plant Sale and Garden Walk.

The Waupaca Library also invited WCMGV to participate in the May 14 program at South Park, "Imagine your Summer." We currently plan to hold our May meeting at that site in connection with the event. However, due to the current outbreak of the Corona virus, upcoming meetings and events may be cancelled since the MG program is a part of the UW system. Greg B. will keep the group informed. The group thanked Greg B. for his years of service as he announced that he will be retiring as of June 5.

Pat R. motioned to adjourn the meeting, with a second by Joan S.

Plant Sale Update (FALL)

It was a difficult decision to cancel the Spring Plant Sale, but given the current status of the pandemic, it was the right decision. Fortunately, though, the Education building at the Fairgrounds was available in September for a <u>Fall</u> <u>Plant Sale</u>, so I reserved the building for **Saturday, September 19**. This will give us something positive and FUN to look forward to in the upcoming months!

With that in mind, as you tend to your gardens this Spring, look at what plants you could divide and put in pots that would do well over the summer. Or you could plant back into the ground after dividing, leaving enough room to dig up the entire plant for the Fall sale. Also, remember, the Fall is a good time to dig and divide irises and tender bulbs/tubers/rhizomes. Take photos of the blossoms. Pictures always boost sales!

We have a lot of time to plan and prepare for the Fall Plant Sale! I am grateful for this time.

Bouncing Bet or Soapwort (Saponaria officinalis) Creeping Bellflower (Campanula rapunculoides) Crown Vetch (Coronilla varia) Dame's Rocket (Hesperis matronalis) Flowering Rush (Butomus umbellatus) Goutweed (Aegopodium podagraria) Japanese Knotweed (Polygonum cuspidatum) Lily-of-the-Valley (Convallaria majalis) Orange Daylily (Hemerocallis fulva) Oxeye Daisy (Chrysanthemum *leucanthemum*) Purple Loosestrife (Lythrum salicaria) Ribbon Grass (Phalaris arundinacea) Tansy (Tanacetum vulgare) Yellow Garden Loosestrife (Lysimachia vulaaris) Yellow or Water-flag Iris (Iris pseudacorus)

Vines:

English Ivy (Hedera helis) Oriental Bittersweet (Calastrus orbiculatus) Periwinkle or Myrtle (Vinca minor) Wintercreeper or Climbing Euonymus (Euonymus fortunei)

Shrubs:

All plants brought to the plant sale must be identified. If you can't identify it, it may be on this "Don't Bring" list, so don't bring it. This is especially important!
