Did you know that you have the right to make decisions about your health care?

This includes the right to accept or refuse medical or surgical treatment. You also have the right to plan and direct the types of health care you may receive in the event you become unable to express your wishes. You can do this by making an "Advance Directive". Addressing these issues may be difficult but it is necessary if you want others to follow your wishes. Participants will learn the types of Advance Directives in WI and how to access and file them.

### Oshkosh Corrections invites Community Partners for Thank You Lunch



Our contact at the Oshkosh Corrections Prison, Katherine Sabel invited Myrtle Kutchenriter and Marilyn Herman to a thank you luncheon on Wednesday, April 5<sup>th</sup> for the 15 organizations and community service groups that have worked with their inmates over the past three years. Covid lockdowns at the prison prevented a gathering like this for

several years. Waupaca County HCE has donated carloads of yarn each year to the Winter Wear Project and in return, have received 250 or more hand-knitted hats, mittens and scarf sets for distribution to children in Waupaca County. Our partnership with the inmates started in 2003 when HCE took over the local project from the Waupaca County Department of Health. This year marks our 20<sup>th</sup> year of joint outreach.

## **Plastic Cap Collection Project Update**



The New London Senior Center held plastic cap and covers sorting days on January 25- 26, February 22-23 and March 29-30. HCE members, Karen Euhardy and Marilyn Herman lent a hand to the effort. Doris

Budwit reported that a truckload of plastic caps have been collected, cleaned and sorted from donations and a truck will be loaded to deliver them to the processing plant in Indiana in May. Thanks to a generous donation to the City of New London and the Senior Center, the cost for the truck, gas and overnight lodging is being covered by a local company. Many hands and hearts make this project a successful one. There should be enough plastic collected to have 6 or 7 park benches made. Each bench takes 225-250 pounds of plastic caps.

What does the sorting involve? Each cap must be inspected to confirm it is on the acceptable type list, and to be sure it is clean (any sugary or sticky food on the cap will interact with the resin added to the plastic and make the final bench weaker and likely to break) and dry (if plastic is wet it will encourage mold which means the whole 50 pound container must be thrown out), has no paper or foam insert (must be removed). **The last sorting day of this spring is April 26-27 from 9-4**. An Iceland factsheet and recipes were made available to all attendees. If you need a copy, please contact Marilyn Herman or a copy can be emailed to you.



### **See You at HCE's Spring Meeting**



# EXTENSION SCENE...

Waupaca County Life Span & Financial Security Programming
Updates & Future Programming by Tiffany Iliadis

Over the past several months, I have been meeting with a number of community partners, in order to assess Waupaca County residents' needs in the areas of Life Span and Financial Security. I met with County and municipal departments and local nonprofits to discuss current resources supporting residents in healthy aging, end-of-life-planning, caregiving support, and creating social connections, as well as to discuss potential gaps in resources and how we might collaborate on overcoming those gaps with future programming.

I also had the opportunity to deliver a virtual presentation on scams targeting seniors, as part of the UW Extension's Wise Wisconsin series, and I learned a lot about the risk of elder fraud in our community and in the State and nation at large. I look forward to adapting this lecture to deliver locally, in order to further inform our residents on how to protect themselves from scams. Meanwhile, I recommend those interested in prevention tips or needing to report a scam attempt consult the WI Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection's website and/or the Federal Trade Commission's website.

I was also able to represent UW Extension at the Waupaca County Caregiver Coalition's Annual Resource Fair at the Waupaca County Senior Center in recent weeks. This allowed me the chance to speak with more individual community members about their experiences with aging in the community and to promote our upcoming programming, which includes the following:

#### **Planning Ahead**

Planning Ahead is a course that helps guide participants in planning for end of life for themselves and others, as well as for those who have lost a loved one and are dealing with the accompanying transitions. This program is 7 sessions (90 minutes each) and will cover topics, such as handling financial changes, advance medical and legal directives, estate planning, choices in end-of-life care, final wishes, and understanding grief. This course includes a free workbook to guide participants through this process and to assist in tracking important information. We will be offering this program virtually on the following dates and at the following times: Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12 p.m.-1:30 p.m.-7/18, 7/20, 7/25, 7/27, 8/1, 8/3, and 8/8.

#### **Aging Mastery**

Aging Mastery is a 10-week program created by the National Council on Aging that covers topics, such as healthy living, nutrition, exercise, sleep, financial fitness, medication management, and more. This program has helped participants to increase adoption of healthy habits and is evidence-based. We hope to offer this program virtually and/or in person in the fall or winter.

**Rent Smart** Rent Smart is typically a 6-session program that focuses on helping renters to build their knowledge and skills to be a successful renter. This course is currently offered virtually across WI counties ongoing.
