Plastic Caps & Covers to Benches Update



July 25th, the Senior Center of New London received 8 benches from Indiana for the 1500 pounds of plastic that the volunteers had sorted & cleaned earlier this summer. Some benches are 4 feet. others are 6 foot long. Hilker Trucking provided the full transportation costs for this second trip to take down the plastic and return with finished benches. This time

the benches are blue, the first batch of benches or parking stops were Irish green or red.

New London Senior Center was awarded \$3,100 by Theda Care's Community Fund to cover expenses for the Plastic Caps to Benches recycling program. For this second trip the Senior Center purchased benches for New London's Hatten Stadium dugouts and another for the center itself, as a display sample. That leaves \$2,000 in the fund to pay for transportation expenses and lodging in Phase Three.

Lori Schneider, Senior Center Director who is in charge of this project, wants to do another collection of plastics to be sorted on September 26 & 27 from 9-4 pm by volunteers.

I appreciate all the plastics our HCE organization has been collecting. I'm hoping you all will continue to collect these plastics. I will clean and sort them whenever you bring them to our meetings. Doing this project helps eliminate plastics from going into the landfills and makes the community a more inviting place to get out into nature.

LaFaye Ireton, 96, went to her heavenly home on May 24th, 2023.

LaFaye Steck Ireton was born on February 16th, 1927 as the second daughter to the late Beryl and Bessie (Howard) Steck. LaFaye married Allen (Bud) Ireton in Riverside, CA on August 28th, 1943. They farmed in Lind Center, WI, raised three children, and retired from farming in 1969.

LaFaye lived life to the fullest, spending time with family and friends, especially her 6 grandchildren and 13 greatgrandchildren. She was an active member of First Presbyterian Church, volunteered at the Weyauwega food pantry and middle school, read books for Head Start, was involved with the Waupaca County HCE homemaker's club for 50 years, and served on countless other committees. She loved square dancing with Bud, golfing, camping with friends, and playing cards with everyone, winning every time.

LaFaye is survived by her daughters, grandchildren. She is further survived by her sister, sisters-in-law, and many nieces and nephews.

The celebration of life for LaFaye was held on Saturday, June 3rd, 2023, at First Presbyterian Church Weyauwega, WI). LaFaye's certificate recognizing her 67 years as a Waupaca County HCE member was awarded to the family and put on



display at her funeral.

Dorothy, age 89 of the Township of Belle Plaine, Shawano County, passed away Monday June 19, 2023 at her home surrounded by family, after a courageous 7 year battle with cancer.

Dorothy "Dottie" Mae White was born August 31, 1933 in Antigo, WI daughter to the late Herbert & Viola (Miller) Dickman. She attended school in Birnamwood, WI and graduated in 1951, working as a telephone operator in Wausau for a time. Dottie was united in marriage to Karl E. White on September 19, 1953 in Birnamwood. They started a family and lived in Mattoon for a time, moved to Clintonville in 1956, and finally moved out to Cloverleaf Lakes in 1957 where they have lived since. She then started working for Urban Telephone for 25 years until they closed, at which point she went back to school and earned her CNA license at the age of 59. Dottie's compassion really helped her succeed in the field as she loved to help people and took great pride in her work. She worked for D.E.N. Home Health Care, Waupaca County, and volunteered for home hospice through Shawano Hospital, later ThedaCare Shawano. Dottie retired at the age of 73. In 2012, Shawano County awarded her with Volunteer of the Year. She was very active with the Modern M and M's HCE Homemaker's Club, working with young children's reading programs where the kids affectionately called her "Grandma Bookworm." It was a fitting name for someone who consistently read over 200 books every year; she had read over 130 books in 2023 alone. Taking part in the Wisconsin Homemaker's Friendship Choir was something she greatly enjoyed, traveling around most of the United States and many countries in Europe. She also achieved the highest authority within the Order of the Eastern Star as Worthy Matron. Dottie cherished the memory of going up in a hot air balloon in New Mexico, and even helped with launch and landing. She journaled every day as a way to look back on past days and now her family can also enjoy reading the things she wrote. Watching the wildlife in her yard on the lake, especially the birds, was always a wonder to behold. Dottie will be remembered for her love of family, her insatiable appetite for books and learning, the empathy she had for her fellow human and her 33 years of HCE membership.

- Laughing puts your body at ease. When you laugh, your body relaxes its muscles and releases stress.
- Laughing makes you feel good. When you laugh, endorphins get released and deliver you the feel-good status you deserve.
- Laughing helps you fight diseases. When you laugh, your immune system is boosted as diseasefighting cells increase, improving your ability to fight infections and to ward off all types of diseases.
- Laughing can protect your heart and even help you lose weight. Sounds crazy? Not really! When you regularly laugh, you get better blood flow which can help protect your entire cardiovascular



system. Plus, laughing burns calories—so when you regularly laugh, you could shed a few pounds over a year's time.

- Laughing makes you happy. When you laugh with others, you can avoid stressful situations and conflict—and laughing can help free you from harboring grudges that just make you feel bad.
- Laughing might even help you live longer! One study found that those battling cancer lived longer and happier lives when blessed with regular doses of humor and laughter.
