Safety Tips from Special Interest Meeting "Fire Prevention and Home Safety" Could Save Your Life





The Monday, September 25 session at the Manawa Fire Department on Fire Prevention and Home Safety was packed with useful information. The Manawa fire chief, Josh Smith explained how carbon monoxide detectors (CO2) should be mounted about one foot from the floor as CO2 is heavy and builds from the floor up. There should be one on every floor and especially near any wood burner, furnace, water heater, fireplace etc. A smoke detector should be mounted on the ceiling or one foot down from the ceiling as smoke is lighter than air and travels up. There should be a smoke detector on EVERY floor of your home to give you the best chance of getting out of a fire safely. Get separate smoke and CO2 detectors for best protection. Battery operated devices will expire so check the dates on the back of the device. Some manufacturers like Kidde will replace the unit free of charge if it does not operate for the full time it is under warranty.



We found out how heavy a fire extinguisher can be! Best to have one easily available so you don't have to carry it too far from a potential fire. The fire department will look over your extinguisher and recommend how and when to replace or refill. It is important to turn your extinguisher upside down every few months, smack the bottom with your hand or rubber mallet to loosen the contents so it lasts longer.

Fire extinguishers with a metal top nozzle can be refilled. A plastic nozzle extinguisher cannot be refurbished. We were able to practice using a fire extinguisher, which should be pointed to the base of a fire to knock it down. Aim too high and you could actually spread a fire!

Wisconsin – Nicaragua Partners Shoe Box Donation from Waupaca HCE

WAHCE asked each county to prepare a box the size of a shoebox to send to our partners in the Learning Centers in Nicaragua with cooking, sewing or school supplies. We gathered items for the shoebox this summer. I had a big shoe box, so room for lots of stuff. We have 2 pairs of work gloves, combs, 4 hair accessories, toothbrushes. For sewing, 2 sets of sewing scissors, elastic, 2 boxes of pins, 4 packages of needles, 2 multi packs of thread, plus some loose spools, 4 measuring tapes, 1 pkg of embroidery floss, variety of seam binding and lace, 2 zippers, some hook and eye fasteners. For school, 4 pink erasers,6 pencil sharpeners, 2 pkgs of pencils,1 pkg of lined paper, 2 scissors,2 pkg of crayons, 10 rulers, and wooden spoons.

I took it over to Helen's house as they were going to conference on Monday with the Cultural Arts entries and there was room in the car.

Why We Must Eliminate Violence Against Women

Saturday, November 25 – United Nations International Day to Eliminate Violence Against Women. Wear Orange to represent a brighter future, free from violence against women and girls. Violence against women and girls is one of the most widespread, persistent and devastating human rights violations in our world today. It remains largely unreported due to the impunity, silence, stigma and shame surrounding it.

More than 1 in 3 women experience gender-based violence during their lifetime

More than 5 women or girls are killed every hour by someone in their own family

Less than 40 per cent of women who experience violence seek help of any sort

In general terms, violence manifests itself in physical, sexual and psychological forms, including:

- intimate partner violence (battering, psychological abuse, marital rape, femicide);
- sexual violence and harassment (rape, forced sexual acts, unwanted sexual advances, child sexual abuse, forced marriage, street harassment, stalking, cyber- harassment);
- human trafficking (slavery, sexual exploitation);
- female genital mutilation; and child marriage.

The adverse psychological, sexual and reproductive health consequences of violence affect women at all stages of their life. For example, educational disadvantages represents the primary obstacle to universal schooling and the right to education for girls. This is also to blame for restricting access to higher education and even translate into limited opportunities for women in the labor market.

Violence against women continues to be an obstacle to achieving equality, development, peace as well as the fulfillment of women and girls' human rights.



Try using your....hands, feet, arms, legs

Can you hear...the rushing water, the singing birds, the wind?

Are you feeling... scared, excited, tired, safe?

What's your plan... if you climb that boulder, cross that log?
