WAYS WITH SUMMER VEGETABLES WAS MARCH PROGRAM FEATURE



Whether we are planning a garden, a trip to the grocery store or farmer's markets this summer we got great tips on selecting, storing and using the freshest of recipe ingredients. Christi Gabrilska and Hailee Paul, Waupaca County FoodWise Nutrition Educators helped us get new ideas to improve our meals in the coming months. We enjoyed the recipes, pamphlets and draining colander we received as part of the lesson.

Our March Special Interest session "New Ways with

Summer Vegetables" brought 15 HCE members, library patrons and friends together for great conversation, recipes, and taste testing.

Our speakers stressed:

- Buy as local and in-season as possible for best nutrition and shelf life of produce.
- Fresh produce is picked just prior to peak color and maturity to stand up to shipping.
- Frozen produce is picked at the peak, flash frozen and packaged for peak nutrition.
- If canned fruits or vegetables are the best price option, drain and rinse to remove added salt or sugar if lowsodium vegetables or fruit packed in water or juice is not an option.
- If a full garden is not an option for you consider growing vegetables like tomatoes, peppers, or herbs in containers or pots.
- Follow timing and amount of fertilizer recommendations carefully to insure that they are no longer added to the soil prior to harvest to insure they are not active in the fresh produce.

Bell Pepper Nachos

- 4 bell peppers
- 1 cup salsa
- 2 tsp. seasoning (mixture of chili powder, garlic powder, ground cumin, black pepper)
- 2 cups cooked and shredded meat or drained canned pinto or chili beans or tofu
- 3/4 cup shredded or crumbled cheese

Directions

Wash hands with soap and water.

Wash bell peppers, remove seeds and cut into bitesized pieces. Arrange in a single layer on a large baking sheet.

In a medium bowl, combine salsa, seasonings and meat or canned and drained beans. Heat together in frypan until bubbly. Spoon over pepper pieces. Top with grated cheese or fresh cilantro, diced fine.

Serve. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

Plastic Bench Recycling Project Update

for the purpose of providing recycled plastic benches to places throughout New London. This month during two sorting days, 12 volunteers sorted metal, dirt and debris from 155 pounds of caps. In February they sorted 210 pounds of caps. We now has 1,235 pounds of caps to transport to the recycling plant in Indiana. That could yield up to 6 benches. When the caps are dropped off in Indiana, pre -ordered benches are loaded for the return trip.

The Senior Center staff is always appreciative of volunteers and encourage folks to spend a few hours helping out. The last sorting days before summer break

are April 24 and 25, and May 29 and 30 from 9 am to 4 pm at New London Senior Center, 600 W. Washington Street. Come for an hour or two, or come for the day. The objective of the Learning Center Program is to provide and promote opportunities to develop skills that will improve vocational options, income, self-sufficiency and empowerment for people living throughout Nicaragua.

The training opportunities empower women/people with skills that can be put in practice from their own home or other community outlets. For example, sewing, hair care, tailoring and culinary specialties such as cake decorating and specialty baking are in demand. With minimal training, these types of skills can be immediately applied as a personal or commercial service. The results have been astounding as women and men acquire skills and an inspirational level of self-determination.

If you have small items to include in our Waupaca County Shoebox that can be used for sewing, hair care, baking, or school supplies please bring them to the Spring Recognition Event or get them to our International Coordinator, Karen Stuhr before this event.
