












WHOO Loves the Library?

Bradley Shipps, Regional Director of the Waupaca and Outagamie Library System (17 libraries) and network technology support for 30 locations including the Brown County libraries was our guest speaker at this public invited program on November 25th at the Sturm Memorial Library. Our local public libraries have been meeting our learning and community gathering needs for over 100 years. Program highlights included seeing how local libraries make our lives interesting; gave a glimpse of what is on the horizon for local library services and demonstrated how libraries help our communities thrive. Since Covid our local libraries have greatly expanded broadband, internet, technology support and software service for our communities. Your InfoSoup library card opens these resources to all residents. Last year more than 830.000 book titles were requested in our two-county network with 2-3 day delivery to your local library. Little known but well-used library services include a notary service, witnessing signatures, tech support for learning about computers and Job Resources. Recollection Wisconsin helps anyone research magazines, ancestry, newspapers, local history and obituary indexes. The key library

focus is literacy.



That includes child and adult reading literacy, financial literacy, information literacy, homeschool, English as a Second Language and Adult Basic Education as well as cybersecurity literacy. Summer Library programs work to limit summer slide of reading skills by children and teens, as well as offering community space for tutoring, virtual job interviews, meeting rooms, teen spaces, exhibit space, telehealth, maker spaces and play spaces. Both New London and Fremont will be building new facilities in the next year with special grants and community fundraising support to keep our community libraries thriving.

How can we support our local libraries? Spread the word about what is happening at the library, join the friends of the library, talk to your elected officials about the benefits of your library to you, volunteer for special projects or advisory boards and advocate for the library budget at the local, county

and state level.



2024 Donated Plastic Caps turned into Eight Benches

This is our third year of collecting, cleaning and sorting plastic caps to be made into benches. On November 8, 2024, 1550 pounds of caps were transported to Evansville Indiana. Eight benches were made, loaded and brought back to New London.
